BRISBANE TRIP.

The boxers and footballers who recently visited Brisbane to take part in special activities in conjunction with Brisbane's Jubilee Celebrations, returned home this week, after a very successful tour.

On arrival at Roma Street railway station a week ago they were met by Inspector Daffin who accompanied them to the Exhibition grounds where they were domiciled during their stay in Brisbane. At the same grounds were representatives from Cherbourg and Woorabinda Settlements as well as fifty six Torres Strait Islanders.

The catering for this large family was in the capable hands of Mr and Mrs Vees of Cherbourg, assisted by a small band of willing workers from that Settlement. Great praise is due to these people for their untiring efforts in caring so well for such a large family.

Concerts were held in the city Hall on three different nights, while a boxing tournament was conducted at the Stadium on the Tuesday night and the grand finale on Thursday night. This took the form of an open air entertainment at the Exhibition Oval when a football match was played in bare feet between Cherbourg and Palm Island Settlements, special Island dancing by the Torres Strait contingent, concert items from Cherbourg artists, and tree climbing and fire lighting exhibitions by our own Palm Islanders.

The programme presented on the Thursday night in Brisbane was repeated in Ipswich on the Friday night.

During all these celebrations, a combined display of Aboriginal Arts and Crafts from the three Settlements was on display in the Lord Mayor's reception room at the city Hall, where several thousands of people saw the display. (continued on opp. page)
