STRANGE FOODS

Everybody has heard of the Frenchman's liking for snails - of the right kind. The people of ancient Rome ate them too, after rearing them carefully on meal and wine. The Romans also used to fatten and eat dormice, and in parts of China today a dish of young mice is a treat for high days and holidays. They are served up alive soon after their birth and eaten after being dipped in a kind of treacly sauce, which gives them added flavor.

Besides the famous bird's-nest soup, the Chinese eat plump sea-slugs, almost as big as a man's hand, which make sustaining broth. In the Mediterranean countries, all kinds of sea
