Settlement schools had the same facilities for educating children to the 8th grade as mainland schools and every opportunity was offered to aboriginal children to go as far as possible in the educational field.

While final assimilation into the general community was the wholehearted aim of the Queensland Government, he stated emphatically that the presss should be a gradual one and only as the families concerned became fitted for the transaction.
